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Paper-II (GS-1): Indian Heritage, History, Geography, and Society

The Strategic Shift: While History was the initial heavyweight, **Geography and Indian Society** now dominate, accounting for nearly 65-70% of the paper's total marks in recent years.

- **Geography:** Focus has moved from pure physical geography to **applied geography** (e.g., impact of technology like GIS/drones) and **economic geography**.
- **Indian Society:** UPSC now prioritizes current social problems like **urban governance, public health, and tribal development** over general social structures.

- **History:** The Freedom Struggle remains a core area, but Modern History has stabilized at a lower weightage compared to earlier years.

The Powerhouse: Indian Polity is the undisputed foundation, consistently accounting for roughly 115-125 marks (nearly 50% of the paper).

- **Polity & Constitution:** Aim for 100% conceptual clarity; prioritize the applicability of constitutional amendments and rights.
- **International Relations:** Almost exclusively dynamic; questions are tied to bilateral groupings and global agreements affecting India's interests.
- **Social Justice:** Focus on the management of social sectors like Health and Education, particularly for vulnerable groups.

The Diverse Engine: Indian Economy is the most stable pillar, but the combination of S&T, Environment, and Security has grown to reach 100+ marks consistently since 2020.

- **Economy:** All questions typically demand a synthesis of static knowledge and current economic developments (e.g., food inflation, public expenditure).
- **Internal Security:** Has become a high-priority area; focus on narco-terrorism, cybersecurity, and border management.
- **Environment & DM:** Highly focused on climate-induced disasters like urban floods and pollution mitigation.

The Balanced Pillar: This paper is strictly divided into two equal halves of 125 marks each: Section A (Theory) and Section B (Case Studies).

- **Section A (Theory):** Questions increasingly use notable quotes to test your ability to apply philosophical wisdom to modern governance.
- **Section B (Case Studies):** Case studies have become more complex and lengthy, often without paragraph breaks, testing your stamina and ethical reflexes under pressure.
- **Thinkers:** Since 2018, there has been a steady inclusion of questions on moral thinkers and philosophers, typically worth around 30 marks.
